The relaxed atmosphere of the Pig Roast seemed but a pleasant and distant memory as dawn broke on Saturday morning with all the flurry of activity that goes with "show day". Boats were arriving and being prepared for viewing and /or judging. Registration and Woodywear were setting up for a busy day's activity. Our spectacular exhibit of the Chapter's history was being set up as well. Judges were preparing for the significant challenge that they faced, given the high quality of the boats being judged. As all preparations seemed to be moving along nicely, suddenly, our attention was drawn to a pirate ship, the HMS Tomfoolery, as she rounded the bend and crossed close aboard of the yacht club docks preparing to give us a "broadside". We were under siege! But fate was kind to us as repeated attempts to fire the pirates' cannon failed. It came to pass that the Commodore of the Lake Hopatcong Yacht Club, Jim Flinn, along with the Vice and Rear Commodores, Dan Edwards and Mike Smith, were on board and were released to be part of the Opening Ceremonies of the show. Jackie Seugling sang the National Anthem, and the colors were raised by the three Commodores after which the Boy Scouts of Troop 276 lead us in the Pledge of Allegiance. Judging then commenced while Past President, Bob Larson, simultaneously mentored the Junior Judging Program with the Boy Scouts eagerly participating.

We have long held that our show is made better and more interesting by the participation of antique boaters from off the lake. This year we had several travel with their boats to be part of the show, some from great distances. Gene Porter traveled from Nashua, NH with his 1934 Lyman, while Jim and KJ Davis joined us from Pittsford, NY with their 1958 Century Raven. Gary Fisher came from Moneta, VA with his 1946 Gar Wood Ensign, and Lee Hunt from Midlothian, VA brought his 1955 Chris Craft Capri. Also traveling some distance were Chad Brenner from Philadelphia with his race boat in "framed out" status and Jack Brooks from Wayne, PA with his 1976 Ocean City lifeboat. Also from off the lake but more local were Bob Egelhoff with his 1959 Century Arabian and Frank and Lynn Mizer with their 1948 Mihms Craft Speed Skiff, both from Brick, NJ. Lenny Gerardo brought his 1951 Chris Craft Holiday from Port Reading, NJ, and James Koukoulas was here with his 1950 Chris Craft Racing Runabout from Sparta, NJ. Also from Sparta was Michael Wiard with his 1962 Penn Yan Baltic. Finally, Horacio Barakat brought his 1940 hand crafted row boat from Chatham, NJ. A special mention must be made of Seth Katz's exhibit of Thaver IV and Mariah, the boats from the movie, On Golden Pond. There is an inherent thrill when one stands next to and views a boat which was driven by Henry Fonda with Katherine Hepburn on board

Large crowds of spectators were on the docks all day with John Kadimik giving rides in his 100+ year old Fay & Bowen Launch for much of the day.

At 3:00 pm the Cruise-By was conducted with the boats passing in review just off the Yacht Club docks followed by a quiet time during which judging results were tabulated in preparation for the Awards Dinner that evening.

After cocktails and dinner that evening we settled in with some anticipatory excitement to learn the results of the judging (See "2013 Show Winners" elsewhere in this issue). Winners had the special honor this year of having their awards presented by Dunc Hawkins, President of ACBS.

Sunday morning we rendezvoused off the Jeff House for the Parade around the lake which ended at Cragmere, the beautiful lakeside home of Susan Mook Pocsik and Bucky Mook. It was a wonderfully relaxing culmination to the show as we enjoyed their exceptional hospitality as we have for so many years before.



What a special evening! We convened at the Lake Hopatcong Yacht Club, excited at the prospect of spending an evening with noted and 2012 author inductee into the Hagerty Hall of Fame, Anthony Mollica. The evening was all that had we eagerly anticipated, and more!

After cocktails and a sumptuous lobster feast, an overflow crowd settled in to hear Tony take us on a captivating tour through the little known, inside story of the history of Chris Craft. The focus of his presentation was the substance of his latest book, Chris Craft: Inside the Factories, a collaboration with Chris Smith....grandson of Christopher Columbus Smith who started it all. Tony shared how the company operated and thrived during the challenging times of the depression and World War II while other companies did not. A focus on the nuts and bolts of operations inside the factory was extremely fascinating and informative and gave us insight into how Chris Craft actually built a boat, from the initial lofting to the actual construction and finishing processes. Tony's broad knowledge of the subject was overwhelmingly apparent, and coupled with his infectious exuberance, made our experience most enjoyable. It is no surprise that Tony has long been, and continues to be a very sought after speaker on a broad range of topics in the antique boating milieu.

Tony very generously brought and offered at a substantial discount several copies of the many books he has authored, and we shamelessly swarmed him after his presentation. Notwithstanding the crowd at hand, Tony took the time to autograph each text.

It was our extreme pleasure and honor to have Anthony Mollica join us for an evening. He is a genuine treasure to all that is this love of boats from days gone by, and his contribution over the years has been exceptional and immense. There is only one other who made a similarly immense contribution.....the late Bob Speltz.

To conclude the evening, we took the opportunity to make Tony an "Honorary Member" of the Lake Hopatcong Chapter.

Wayne Mocksfield Honored

Presented with Mook Memorial Award

The Lake Hopatcong Chapter of the ACBS has established an award in the name of the late H. Drayton Mook, a pioneer in creating a club, now international in scope, to preserve and celebrate antique boats. Drayton made a long standing and immeasurable contribution to the furtherance of antique boating.

The award, appropriately, is presented to honor someone who has made a similarly significant and long standing contribution. This year, Wayne Mocksfield of Mt. Arlington was honored with the Mook Award during the Awards Dinner at the Annual Antique Boat Show. Wayne's contribution to the world of antique boating is widely known. A boat lover all of his life at the lake, he began to restore the old boats as a hobby. He purchased a marina as a young man, and while his intent was not to focus on boat restorations, the business just went that way. Wayne became a restorer of national renown with boats from his shop winning top awards at the most prestigious antique boat shows. Wayne's business can be counted as the major factor that sustained the population of antique boats on Lake Hopatcong through the challenging years of the emergence of fiberglass boats.

But Wayne's impact was felt far a field of Lake Hopatcong. He was one of a handful of visionaries, along with Drayton, who met at Lake George in the mid 1970's for the purpose of forming an antique boat club to save, preserve, and celebrate the old boats that were disappearing from the boating landscape. As a product of those meetings, The Antique & Classic Boat Society Inc. was formed in 1975....an organization now approaching 7,000 members. Wayne was there from the beginning and is a Charter Member.

Called "The Antique Boat Specialist" by some and "Professor" by others, it is for his life long and far reaching contributions to the hobby of antique boating that Wayne Mocksfield is most deserving to be honored with the H. Drayton Mook Memorial Award.

Today, while retired, Wayne remains active restoring boats from his still impressive inventory. During the summer, he can be seen often enjoying a ride from his lakeside Mt. Arlington home in one of his many boats.

It was a great show, and it was wonderful to see so may of our members enjoying it all.



Globe was a small but innovative manufacturer in Wisconsin during the late forties into the early fifties. A rare boat with fewer than ten listed in the ACBS Directory, they are unusual and interesting boats. The Real Runabouts Volume II of the Speltz books tells us that the 1949 14' inboard was introduced at the New York Boat Show and was the hit of the show. Wiki Wiki is the "R-6" split cockpit model....14' long, 59 inches wide and weighing just 750 lbs, including the 45 hp Gray Marine engine which propelled the boat at speeds up to a thrilling 33 mph!

Metal Castings Workshop

Doug Mehring Shares Expertise

On April 20th about fifty of our members convened at Junction 46 to hear Doug Mehring address the topic of casting methods used to create hardware for our boats.

The depth and breadth of Doug's command of the subject was readily apparent as he detailed, with his characteristic exuberant enthusiasm, the processes of making metal castings. He took us through two main processes, the sand casting and lost wax methods. He explained that the latter method produced a significantly more precise detail in the final casting.

In addition, Doug spoke of making three dimensional wooden patterns from which the castings are made, giving insight into just how demanding that process can be as he calculates and allows for the shrinkage factor in the metal during the casting process to assure that that end product is exactly the correct size.

To allow us to better understand and grasp the processes which he was describing, Doug brought several examples of metal castings and the wooden patterns from which they were made.

All who were there left with an awe for Doug's command of the subject and a pretty good overview of how castings are made. One thing emerged with graphic clarity. If you have questions about metal castings, Doug is the "go to guy" to talk with.

Golden Years Underway with Sam Hoagland at the Helm with Jerrie and Guest Enjoying the Ride

This year marks the 100th anniversary of the building of Sam and Jerrie Hoagland's 1913 Matthews Launch, *Golden Years...*the oldest Matthews in existence! To better grasp just how old *Golden Years* is, the reader may enjoy a trip back in time to look at some of the noteworthy events occurring one hundred years ago.

The year 1913 saw Charlie Chaplin sign with Keystone Pictures to begin his film career, though vaudeville still dominated the entertainment world. In sports, Notre Dame used the innovative, if not controversial "forward pass" to defeat a heavily favored ARMY team, and Ebbets Field, former home of the Dodgers opened in Brooklyn. In aeronautics 1913 saw the first "loop the loop" done and the first pilot to parachute from his plane. Arguably the event of greatest significance of 1913 was Henry Ford's innovation in automobile manufacturing with the creation of the assembly line. With the growing number of cars, the first coast to coast paved road opened....the Lincoln Highway, and the first "drive up" gas station opened that year, as well. The first traffic light in the country was soon to follow in 1914. In boating, powerboat ownership and use was growing substantially, owing largely to advances in adapting automobile engines for marine use. "Motor Boating" magazine was thriving in 1913, with issues of over 200 pages packed with ads for marine supplies for the growing population of pleasure boating enthusiasts.

We can see that Golden Years has existed through a span of time during which advancements in technology grew exponentially, far beyond the imagination of the most gifted and prescient futurists of 1913, to today when our vocabulary reflects the times in which we live with such terms as "space walk" and "wifi".

Notwithstanding all the transformational changes in technology that have occurred over the past 100 years, *Golden Years* has survived largely unchanged, save some minor wood work on the stem, a new transom, new upholstery, and a new convertible top, along with normal cosmetic attention. She is still powered by her original engine.....a 4 cylinder Scripps.

It is noteworthy that *Golden Years* welcomed state dignitaries of the highest order on board. It is well documented that three Presidents of the United States have enjoyed a pleasure cruise on the graceful and historic launch, and it is highly likely that a fourth President may have similarly enjoyed its timeless ambiance.

At the 2013 Lake Hopatcong Show Golden Years was honored with both the People's Choice and Lady's Choice Awards by the spectators. On the competitive judging side, she won First Place and Best in Class awards in the Historic Class.
